

Rev Martin Fair has just completed his service to the church as Moderator of the General Assembly, and maybe now that he has more time on his hands, he recently posted the following on our minister's Facebook page. It made me smile and I hope it makes you smile too, especially when we consider how much is appropriate to these Covid times.

I've got this tiny wee book called 'The School of Manners' published in 1701. The first chapter is headed, 'Of behaviour at the Church.'

- 1. Decently walk to thy seat or pew; run not.
- 2. Sit where thou art ordered.
- 3. Shift not seats but continue in the same place.
- 4. Talk not in Church.

5. Fix thine eye upon the Minister; let it not wildly wander to gaze upon any person or thing.

6. Attend diligently to the words of the Minister that thou mayest remember.

7. Be not hasty to run out of the Church when the Worship is ended, as if thou were weary of being there.

8. Walk decently and soberly home.

While the language may be slightly archaic, I'm sure we can picture the scene described. When we stop to consider that our current church building was opened just over 70 years after this book was written, maybe we can begin to imagine the behaviour of the first people who worshipped there. We might smile as we compare our Covid behaviour with that of the 1700s, but I'm sure we can also see just how far we have come in making church accessible for all. As restrictions continue to be lifted, and we no longer have to "sit where thou art ordered", or "shift not seats but continue in the same place" let's continue to make East Kilbride Old the welcoming church it has developed into over the years. Just make sure we all "Walk decently and soberly home!"

As always, the emphasis of these quiz nights is on fun and fellowship with the taking part much more important than the winning – the quizzes are very competitive but hugely enjoyable. Our next (8th) family quiz night is scheduled to take place on Saturday 17^h July at 7pm.

We also have a monthly congregational fun quiz night as well (we have had 4 so far) with the next one scheduled for Friday 2nd July at 7pm – if you are interested in joining us, please email or phone Louise in the Church office to register your interest and she will give you the zoom code to join. Everyone is welcome to join – if you're on your own that's ok as well as we make up teams on the night – if you've not tried it yet why not give it a go this month – we usually have around 30 participating in teams of 5/6 – its great fun and the biggest challenge is getting folk to leave!!

Our weekly on-line Messy Church sessions on a Sunday morning continue with a mixture of fun, games, share & chat, puzzles, quizzes, go & fetch, music, keep fit, as well as arts & crafts, Bible teaching and prayer. We have been providing

this on-line version which is a mix between Sunday School & Messy Church for around 16 months now and my sincere thanks must go to all the children, young people and families together with all the leaders who have faithfully joined us every or most Sunday mornings – their commitment is unquestionable and a simple thank you seems so inadequate but please be assured it is heartfelt. On Sunday afternoon 13th June on a beautiful glorious sunny afternoon, in front of a packed crowd of family and friends, we held our first inter church and community football tournament in memory of Angus McConnell. This took place over almost 3 hours on the Angus McConnell memorial pitch at Kirktonholme Park with 6 teams made up of almost 70 primary school aged children (boys and girls) representing churches within the town and our close neighbouring churches. The teams who attended were (1) EK Old, (2) Cambuslang Parish Church, (3) EK Claremont, (4) Strathaven Trinity Parish Church, (5) EK South Parish Church & (6) St Kenneth's PS / St Brides EK who won the tournament and received the Angus McConnell Memorial shield to keep for a year.

All the children had "a ball playing football" in a competitive but friendly spirit and the whole day and event was a great success.

In July we have our first holiday club which is a sport based outdoor event for 5 mornings (10-12am) from Monday 5th – Friday 9th July in Kirtonholme Park. As you read this magazine, we are about to deliver this event and I hope that after all the planning and preparation the children attending have a great time. I have been overwhelmed with both the number of volunteer helpers (20) from within the congregation as well as the number of children who have registered to attend (40) which includes children from 16 new families which is so positive and encouraging.

On Tuesday 13th July from 9.30-11.30am in the Glebe St Hall (providing the restrictions allow us) and every Tuesday morning during the school holidays we hope to start a brand-new art group which has been made possible with a very generous grant from East Mains Community Council – all are welcome - you don't even need to be able to draw to come along - all materials and resources will be provided. The emphasis of this group is on fun and fellowship we are not intending to create any Van Gogh paintings or budding new artists, simply fun and fellowship whilst drawing, painting or colouring in.

In August we have our second holiday club which is a more traditional indoor event in the Church halls based on 5 of the "I Am" sayings of Jesus. This club will also run for 5 mornings (10-12am) from Monday 9th – Friday 13th August. At the time of writing we have around 40 registered up to attend which includes many new children and new families.

- On an old person's shirt was written a sentence, "I am not 80 years old; I am sweet 16 with 64 years of experience". THAT IS ATTITUDE.


Thank you all for your continued prayers, support and encouragement. I really value and appreciate them.

Christians stand trial under new amendment to the Iranian Penal Code

Three Christians from the Church of Iran denomination stood trial in Karaj, northern Iran, on 21 June 2021, charged with "sectarian activities" under a new amendment to the Iranian penal code. Amin Khaki, Milad Goudarzi and Alireza Nourmohammadi are all from Muslim backgrounds.

The trial of the three men took place at 9am local time at the 4th Chamber of the Revolutionary Court of Karaj and lasted for less than hour. The presiding judge, Mehdi Zeinali, prevented the defendants' lawyer from attending the trial, claiming that he had not been registered as their lawyer. However, CSW's sources confirm the lawyer had fulfilled all necessary requirements ten days before the trial began. During the hearing the judge informed the three defendants that they had no choice but to represent themselves in court.

The three men were initially summoned and interrogated by the 4th branch of the Public and Revolutionary Prosecutor's Office of Ferdis city in May 2021, where they were accused of "engaging in propaganda against the Islamic regime". They were subsequently released on bail and instructed to report to the police every week. The men were also advised to leave the country, and were warned not to pursue any mediation in their case. Seventeen other church members were also interrogated.

The three men are reportedly being charged under a new amendment to the Iranian Penal Code known as Article 500-bis", which deals with "sectarian activities." The amendment was passed by the Iranian Parliament (Majlis) and signed by outgoing president Hassan Rouhani in February 2021. It states that "any deviant education or propaganda that contradicts or interferes with the sacred Islamic shari'a, will be severely punished."

Until now, the Iranian authorities have primarily charged converts to Christianity with "action against state security", a concept inherited from the French law. Iranian judges have systematically misused this notion in recent years to crack down on them.

CSW's sources report that the new amendment targets groups labelled by the authorities as "wrong cults" (فرقه ضاله) in Farsi).

This term is often used by the regime to undermine and persecute groups and movements that have deviated or separated from Twelver Shiism, the official school of thought and judiciary in Iran. It would appear that the Iranian authorities have extended the use of this term to include evangelical and reform movements, as well as conversion from Islam to Christianity.

The amendment allows the authorities to impose a range of punishments, including prison sentences of between two and five years; deprivation of civil rights, such as voting, for up to 15 years, and heavy monetary fines.

Harry, 81, completes epic cycle to raise £9,000 for Bothwell church

A church elder has raised £9,000 after completing a virtual bike ride between Land's End and John o'Groats.

Harry Marsh, 81, pedalled for a total of 62 hours in his garage to complete the 951-mile route which saw him hitting speeds of up to 40mph on downhill stretches.

He took on the "herculean" task to cycle the length of the UK to raise money for Bothwell Parish Church in South Lanarkshire which, like most congregations, has seen its income fall over the last 16-months due to COVID-19.



Mr Marsh hooked up his road bike to a Turbo Trainer which is connected to a laptop loaded with a programme called BKool.

He plotted the route from the south-west of England to the far north of Scotland which gives the rider the realistic simulation of pedalling along actual roads and streets from a static position.

Mr Marsh said he "thoroughly enjoyed the experience", particularly plotting the route which enabled him to cycle through Walton-le-Dale in Lancashire, the town where he was born, and he "waved" at his old house.

The retired business management and development consultant started his journey on the 8th of February and completed it before his birthday on the 6th of May.

He launched an online funding page but received many donations offline and did the final leg as part of the Kiltwalk, which meant money raised was topped up by the Sir Tom Hunter Foundation.

Commenting on his epic endeavour, Mr Marsh said: "There is no air flow in my garage so it's a real sweaty business, even when the temperature gets down to three degrees Celsius.

"The journey back to the house in cold weather gives you a nasty shock but the recovery time with my wife, Joan, providing warm towels and running the bath made it all worthwhile

"The set-up was very good and the system reacts to the actual road so a gradient of 15% is tough and your speed drops to 3mph.

"But downhills are great and I had no problem clocking speeds of 40mph regardless of the tight twists and turns and other traffic."

Mr Marsh said he had to climb 5,000 ft travelling through Devon and Cornwall and the same equivalent height again over the last 80 miles heading to John 'O Groats. "The total climbing for the whole journey is about 27,000ft so the journey is not really that tough, many people would be able to do it," he added.

Mr Marsh said two bottles of Old Pulteney single malt whisky were awarded to people who guessed his total riding time most accurately.
