

HISTORY CORNER

Our Iona Cross is a model of one of the great High Crosses of Iona, commonly called the St John's Cross. For centuries the St John's Cross stood outside the West Door of Iona Abbey Church, close to where the early Columban monastery is thought to have been situated. It blew down in a storm and a replica



- now stands in its place on the original stone base.
- The Cross itself is in the little museum to the East of the Abbey, standing about twelve feet high carved with
- intricate spiral designs.
- Not far away, still in its original position, is another of the great Crosses of Iona, called St Martin's Cross. It has figure scenes carved on it -showing the Virgin and Child, Daniel in the Lions' Den, and Abraham's sacrifice of Isaac.
- These great Crosses date from around the middle of the 8th Century AD, some two hundred years after St Columba first came to lona.
- There are other examples of these free-standing High Crosses in other parts of

Western Isles. One of the best preserved is Kildalton Cross, on Islay. It too dates from the same time as the Iona Crosses. In the centre boss, where the two arms of the Cross meet, there is a circular carving of a bird's nest, with three eggs in it - representing the Trinity. It is possible that the St John's Cross had a similar boss at the centre, though it has been lost.





Our Cross stands on a base of green Iona marble, taken from the old Marble Quarry on Iona's south-east corner. Called Serpentine, this marble is among the oldest rocks on earth.

The Cross reminds us of our roots in the Christian Church in Scotland.

PLANTING OF THE "TREE OF HOPE"

At our recent One World Committee meeting, plans were made for a special event – the planting of the "Tree of Hope".

You may remember that in Christian Aid Week, it was noted that the year 2025 is the 80th anniversary of the start of Christian Aid, just after the end of the Second World War in 1945. One of the suggestions that Christian Aid invited



Churches to consider was planting a Tree of Hope – a symbol of our faith in action for the future.

Here is the date – Saturday 20th September, at 11am. The Tree will be planted in the ground just inside the Church gates. The Tree will be a rowan, called "Autumn Spire" – a columnar-shaped tree, more upright than spreading, with wine-coloured leaves and yellow berries. Anne, our Minister, will do the planting, using a ceremonial spade, provided courtesy of South Lanarkshire Council.

In making these arrangements, we have been wisely guided and greatly helped by Mr Joe Connor of South Lanarkshire Council's Land Services, and by Bill Arthur, one of our Elders and member of the Church Graveyard team. We are much indebted to them both.

Our hope is that the Councill will be represented on the day, as will a member of the staff of Christian Aid Scotland. Everyone who would like to come along on the morning of the 20th will be very welcome.

12 YEARS ON: ACHIEVING MORE, LIVING BETTER, DREAMING BIGGER

Following is an extract from a letter from Daniel Charles, Special Projects Officer, Water Aid:-

Twelve years ago, Water Aid worked alongside the community of Chabota in rural Zambia to install running, clean water for the first time. Just recently, my colleague Caroline returned to spend a few days there— to see how life had changed. The people she met and the photos she showed me were so inspiring I knew I had to share them with you.

One of the first things Caroline noticed was how clean and well-kept the village is, the dusty red earth swept into neat paths underfoot. She soon met Veronica, who runs a thriving baking business with her sister

Doreen. Together they make scones and fritters (which Caroline said were delicious). With clean water on tap, these hard working sisters have invested their time and energy into growing their enterprise—a far cry from the past, when every litre of water meant a long, tiring walk.



"When we came here there was a water crisis. We used to fetch water about 800 metres from here. But after Water Aid came, the water situation became stable."

For over twelve years now, two water kiosks have supplied families in Chabota with clean, running water. Pumped from deep underground into a 10,000 litre tank, the water is piped to the kiosks, where families pay a small fee for each

Bucket they fill—just 50 Ngwee, slightly under 1p for 20 litres.

It's not just Veronica and Doreen who are reaping the financial benefits of running, clean accessible water. Growing and selling vegetables has become a popular way to earn a living—especially for women—and it's led to noticeable improvements in people's homes, many of which are now built from brick.

Caroline also met best friends Tatu and Maureen. Both nine years old, they've never known life without clean water. Isn't that wonderful? Everything you and I work towards is a reality for these two girls, who are spending their childhoods going to school, playing together and dreaming about what they'll be when they grow up.



Clean water means that Tatu and Maureen are protected from dangerous diseases like cholera which is having a deadly resurgence in countries including Zambia.

Chinyama, a local nurse and midwife, shared with Caroline how the health of the local community has improved since clean water.

"Before we used to have a number of diarrhoea cases probably because of water that was not treated, but now our water does get treated."



With better health, more time and steady incomes, the people of Chabota are building fuller, more rewarding lives, able to pursue passions and hobbies. The local football team—the Chisekesi Leopards—is going from strength to strength.

The photograph here is of the captain, Peter, who embodies the joy and energy that clean water has brought to the community.

Each one of these pictures offers a window into someone's world - shaped by clean water.

More News from the One World Committee

USED STAMPS. People continue to put used stamps into the boxes at the Church and the Glebe Street Hall. These in turn are taken in to the Glasgow Presbytery Offices and then on to a Mr Keith Scott who lives in Garelochhead. The proceeds from the sale of used stamps are going this year to Gaza, to the Al Ahli Arab Hospital, a Christian hospital under the auspices of the Anglican Church in Jerusalem.

Word about the fact that we are doing this reached a lady who is a member of a Church in Aberdeen. She sent a message to our Church Office asking about the project and how to get started. We have been in contact with her and now her congregation is about to join the Church's Used Stamp appeal. That's good to know.

LEPROSY MISSION. The Blue Boxes continue to be used by members of the Congregation and their friends. Some boxes are on the shelf at the front door of the Church. They're looking rather lonely! Feel free to take one away and give it a good home. After it is filled up, it can be returned any time.

The work of caring for people with leprosy goes on. Niger is one of the poorest countries in the world (not to be confused with Nigeria). As the only Christian leprosy hospital in Niger, Danja Hospital is a beacon of hope. There, people with leprosy receive the vital care they need free of charge. From the cure of surgery to wheelchairs, the health team works to restore dignity and independence. Recently an eye clinic has been opened, helping to prevent the blindness which leprosy can cause, and helping patients to find new hope for the future. These Blue Tubs really do make a difference!

ECO-CONGREGATION. For some years a notice has been pinned on the notice-board in the Church Hall. It has been there so long and is so faded that it is almost illegible. It announces that East Kilbride Old Parish is an Eco-Congregation. This is something we very much hope we can develop. The Guides, Brownies and Rainbows connected with the Congregation have been doing a lot of work on this theme – have a look at some of their work on the Glebe Street Hall noticeboard. This month, September, is designated "Creation Time" and one of our services will hopefully be able to highlight how important caring for the planet really is. CHRISTIAN SOLIDARITY WORLDWIDE

CSW representatives and supporters participated in a peaceful protest outside the Eritrean Embassy in London on 21 August calling for the release of seven Eritrean church leaders. They have been detained arbitrarily for over two decades.

The event was held under the banner of Voices for Justice, a global campaign bringing together Christian organisations, churches and individuals around the world to mark the International Day Commemorating the Victims of Acts of Violence Based on Religion or Belief.

A series of prayer and protest events have been organised in several countries over 21 and 22 August, including in Belgium, Brazil, Italy, Finland, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Nigeria, Switzerland and the USA, calling for the release of the seven Eritrean church leaders.

The detainees are Rev Haile Naizge, Chair of the Full Gospel Church, and Dr Kuflu Gebremeskel, Chair of the Eritrean Evangelical Alliance, who were arrested on 23 May 2004.

Rev Million (Meron) Gebreselassie, pastor of the Rhema Evangelical Church in the city of Massawa and an anaesthetist at Massawa Hospital, was detained less than two weeks later on 3 June 2004.

On 19 November 2004 the authorities detained Dr Futsum Gebrenegus, at the time Eritrea's only psychiatrist, and Dr Tekleab Menghisteab, a highly respected physician, both of whom are Orthodox priests, along with Rev Gebremedhin Gebregiorgis.

While all three belong to a denomination that is ostensibly permitted to operate by the Eritrean government, they were part of the Orthodox Church's renewal movement, Medhane Alem, which had attracted a large youth following, and which the late patriarch, Abune Antonios, had refused to close down following a government order.

Rev Kidane Weldou, senior pastor of the Full Gospel Church, was seized from the streets of Asmara on 18 March 2005.

It is believed that all seven are being held in Wengel Mermera Criminal Investigation Centre.

The Eritrean government continues to detain members of permitted religious communities arbitrarily. In April 2025 Rev Gebremeskel Hagos, an Orthodox priest based in Switzerland who travelled to Eritrea following the death of his father, was detained incommunicado. In July, Sheikh Adam Shaban, a respected Muslim cleric and the director of the Quran Memorisation Centre in Ghinda, was also detained arbitrarily, reportedly after honouring a summons from the authorities.


At the end of the event in London a letter signed by all who attended was delivered to the Embassy on behalf of voices for justice calling for their release, and for the right to freedom of religion to be accorded in full to every religious community in the country.
